A Message from the Deacon Widow's Outreach Coordinator: Kathryn O'Neill

I hail from New Mexico, specifically the Albuquerque area (Albuquerque/Moriarty/Cedar Crest), where I was born and raised. I completed my high school education at Manzano High School in 1979. In 1983, during our time as Active Duty US Army personnel, I crossed paths with my future husband. Our union took place in Albuquerque in 1986, and thereafter, we embarked on a journey that led us to Germany, where we served in the US Army initially as Army Officers and later as US Army Civilian employees.

Upon our return to the United States in 1998, we were stationed at Red River Army Depot. My husband resumed active status with the

Knights of Columbus, holding roles such as Grad Knight with Council 1003 in Texarkana, Texas. He also took on responsibilities as Knights of Columbus District Deputy and Diocesan Deputy within the Tyler Diocese. Our journey into Deaconate training commenced in 2002 at the University of Dallas.

My late husband was ordained on December 29, 2007, and was assigned to St Mary of the Cenacle Catholic Church in New Boston, Texas, where he faithfully served until his passing on August 5, 2012. I stood by his side throughout, initially as an Army wife, then as a Sir Knights Lady, and eventually as a Deacon's wife and widow.

Presently, I am an active member of Our Lady of Fatima Catholic Church in Albuquerque, New Mexico. Over the past four years, I have been dedicated to serving as the RCIA Instructor, and currently, I hold the position of Coordinator for our newly established ministry, "Military Veteran Outreach." This involves connecting with parishioners who are military Veterans and collaborating with the VA Chaplains Office. I eagerly anticipate contributing to the Archdiocese of Santa Fe as the Deacon Widows Coordinator.

St. Vincent Saragossa - Feast Day Jan 23



We have been watching a magnificent spectacle with the eyes of faith, the holy martyr Vincent everywhere victorious. He was victorious in his words, victorious in the pains he endured; victorious in his confession, victorious in his tribulations; victorious when burned with fire; victorious when submerged in the waves. When his flesh, which was a kind of tribute to the victorious Christ, was thrown into the sea from the boat, it silently said, "We are cast down, but not lost."

~Sermon of Saint Augustine

Saint Augustine greatly admired Saint Vincent of Saragossa, a deacon-martyr from today's Spain. Augustine delivered a series of homilies praising the heroism and faith of this saint, whose martyrdom occurred during the intense persecution of the Church in the early 300s under Diocletian.

According to Augustine, the blood of martyrs is a sacred sacrifice that quells the devil's fires and strengthens the faith of those who reflect on such sacrifices. Augustine emphasized that Vincent's resistance inflicted greater torment on the devil than the persecution Vincent endured. Vincent, known as the "protomartyr," was the first to die for Christ on the Iberian Peninsula.

While little is known about Vincent's life, legends, including Augustine's testimony, shed light on his character. Vincent, a well-spoken deacon, served the speech-impaired Bishop Valerius of Saragossa. Both were arrested by the Roman governor Dacian for refusing to renounce their faith. Vincent faced brutal torture with serenity, fulfilling the words of Scripture.

Despite being scourged, stretched on a rack, burned, and subjected to other torments, Vincent remained at peace, inspiring one jailer to convert. The governor, seeking to break Vincent's resolve, offered comfort, but Vincent rejected it. He died on a soft bed, indifferent to threats or promises. Vincent's body faced disposal, but ravens defended it, or, according to another account, it washed ashore for a dignified burial.

Saint Vincent's final events, according to legend, occurred in southern Spain at Cape Saint Vincent, where ravens and vultures still hover. A prayer honors Saint Vincent for his courage, fidelity to Christ, and glorious martyrdom, seeking his intercession for strength in daily sacrifices of love.

Prayer. Saint Vincent, in the face of persecution and torture, you remained courageous, even fixated on the love of Christ. You conquered the evil one by your fidelity and were crowned with glorious martyrdom. Please pray for me, that I may also receive that crown through my daily sacrifices of love. Saint Vincent, pray for me. Jesus, I trust in You.

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Deacon Formation Report

This year will be a transition year for both of our deacon formation cohorts. The 15 men in their second year of Candidacy will be installed into the ministry of Acolyte this fall bringing them to the brink of ordination in 2025. Their final scrutiny will take place this spring and summer. During this time they will complete two practica – one in prison/hospital ministry and the other in liturgical ministry.

We have 17 Aspirants who will be entering their second year. This is an important year of discernment as they will be scrutinized for admission to Candidacy in 2025. Their major practicum this year will be working with the poor in homeless shelters and soup kitchens.

Our Candidates and Aspirants hale from parishes from each of the seven Deaneries which make up the Archdiocese of Santa Fe. Please keep them in your prayers.

Just a friendly reminder that all deacons must submit an annual report of their continuing education hours to the Deacon Office. This report is typically submitted in January, and the deadline for this year is February 16.

As outlined in the Deacon Manual policy, every permanent deacon is obligated to provide a written report of the continuing education they have undertaken in the previous twelve months. Failure to comply with this requirement may result in the suspension of faculties.

Deacon Personnel Board

The newly organized Deacon Personnel Board met in November. The board, comprised of both clergy and deacon spouses, is in service to the Archbishop, priests, deacons and wives. The board will serve to develop policies and to address a variety of areas related to diaconal service. These include issues such as assignments, retirement and other issues that arise.

As example of the boards work. Currently, a subcommittee is drafting a policy regarding deacon assignments and reassignments. These policies, and others once established, will help to codify processes and procedures to ensure equitable application when need arises.

The assignment/reassignment policy will address not only the initial assignment of deacons but also the thoughtful reassignment of deacons when necessary.

For example, some parishes have many deacons, while others have a need for a deacon but have none; this creates an imbalance of the deacon population that affects our parishes and those we serve. A result of the June ordination of the large Diaconate class of 2023, we have such an imbalance.

Beyond balancing the diaconate population, issues do arise that require the reassignment of a deacon like family or health issues, or other matters that impact the service of the deacon to the parish.

The drafted policy will aim to address these issues while establishing reasonable evaluation standards to reassignment like time in the current parish as a deacon or traveling distances.

To some, a reassignment or even the possibility of reassignment may be cause for some anxiety. Please pray that our enkindled vocation of service be primarily to the salvation of souls and that our minds and hearts be fully open to needs of the people of God and the opportunity to serve the same. In this, we trust our vocation to the Holy Spirit.

The board will continue to work on this and other policies in the coming months.

Rebuild My Church



mentor, spiritual leader and dear friend to many. He is survived by his loving wife of 63 years, Emily; children Louie (Anna), Loretta (Karl) and Anna (Dave); grandchildren, Analicia (Aaron), Andres, Ariela, David, Dillon, Isaiah (Onnica), Carina and Catalina; great grandchildren, Kane, Sophia and Eli. He is also survived by siblings, Leonard Casaus Sr., Edward & Marcella Gygox, Michael & Margaret Lucero, Mary Louise Gygox, David & Mela Gygox, as well as many other family members.

Luis was a faithful and devout Catholic, attending Our Lady of the Most Holy Rosary Church. A creative artisan, he enjoyed wood carving. Other hobbies included gardening, swimming and spending time with family and friends. Luis appreciated special friendships with many groups, including Alzheimer Support, carving class and church/Deacon affiliations.
